World Labyrinth Day is May 4

Saturday, May 4 is World Labyrinth Day for 2024. That is the day set aside by the World Labyrinth Society for enthusiasts throughout the world to share the unique experience of intentionally walking their labyrinths in support of world peace and spiritual awakening.

The labyrinth is found all over the world in many different cultures and forms. It is an archetypal symbol. It is not a maze and you cannot get lost. There is one path that leads to the center. The way in is the way out. You can think about walking the labyrinth as an inward journey, a walking meditation. There is no right or wrong way to walk the labyrinth. While the labyrinth is not a specifically Christian resource, its use as a medium for mediation and contemplation is well-established.

United Christian Parish will participate in World Labyrinth Day this year by opening its full-size Chartres-style labyrinth to all who are interested. Walking this outdoor labyrinth will be the focus of the event, with special emphasis on “Walk as One at 1”—a time when people from every part of the world are encouraged to begin their walk together at 1 PM their local time as a gesture of unity in our desire for world peace.

The event will also include indoor activities in case the weather makes it hard to walk outside.

These will include finger labyrinths to “walk” while seated, paper labyrinths to color, a much shorter indoor labyrinth as an alternative walk, and at least one prayer station focusing on labyrinths as a means of connecting with God’s miraculous work in the world.

The labyrinth can be accessed from North Shore Drive by walking up the steps or from the church parking lot (behind the building) by entering the lobby through the double glass doors and walking across to the opposite set of doors.

UCP volunteers will be present to assist in finding and using the various resources, talking to participants about their experiences if they’d wish, providing water and light snacks, and giving directions to the building’s restroom facilities.

Doors will open at noon and the event will end around 3 PM (or whenever the last walkers have completed their journey.)

This event is open to anyone interested, not just to United Christian Parish members. Feel free to come at any time and invite your friends.

This event is sponsored by UCP’s Worship Ministry as part of our spiritual development program. All of the resources for the event are provided by the ministry and no fees/donations are required.

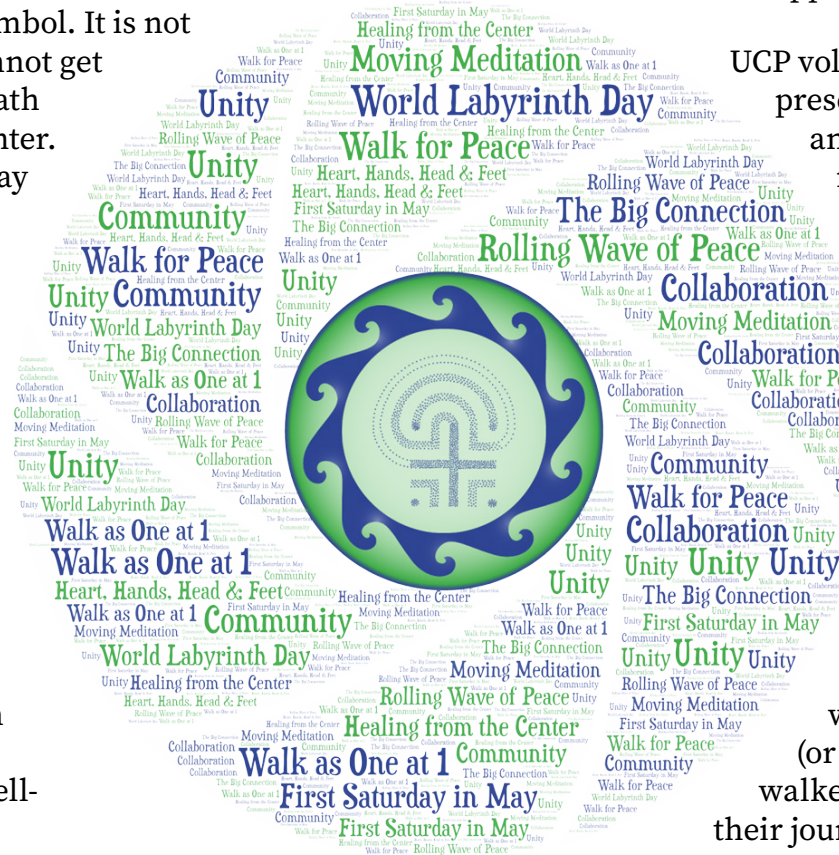

PENTECOST

IS MAY 19

On Pentecost Sunday, United Christian Parish will be having its 51st birthday. When I think of birthdays, I think of cake, maybe balloons and presents. On this day 51 years ago, UCP began a new experience. Instead of one faith, we joined four

faiths together. They were the Methodist, the Presbyterians, the Disciples of Christ, and the United Church of Christ. It was an experience to join four different faiths together and share one common denominator. We believe in Jesus so we are Christians. I think the present of Christ's love is the most special gift one could receive. So, all of us received that special gift and every year we get to celebrate Jesus' love for all of us.

What is Pentecost? Pentecost is a Christian holiday which takes place on the fiftieth day after Easter Sunday. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles of Jesus while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of the Weeks as described in Acts 2:1-31. While the Catholic Church believes the Holy Spirit descended upon Mary, this is not recorded in the New Testament.¹

Pentecost is one of the Great Feasts in the Eastern Orthodox church. The Catholic Church and Lutheran churches also celebrate in their own way. Christian denominations provide a special liturgy for this holy celebration.

Wikipedia¹ states:

The events of Acts Chapter 2 are set against the backdrop of the celebration of Pentecost in Jerusalem. There are several major features to the Pentecost narrative presented in the second chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. The author begins by noting that the disciples of Jesus "were all together in one place" on the day of Pentecost. The verb used in Acts 2:1 to indicate the arrival of the day of Pentecost carries a connotation of fulfillment. There is a "mighty rushing

wind" (wind is a common symbol for the Holy Spirit) and "tongues as of fire" appear. The gathered disciples were "filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance."

In Christian tradition, this event represents fulfillment of the promise that Christ will baptize His followers with the Holy Spirit.

The timing of the narrative during the festival of Pentecost symbolizes both continuity with the giving of the law and also the central role of the Holy Spirit for the early church. The central role of Christ in Christian faith signified a fundamental theological separation from the traditional Jewish faith, which was grounded in the Torah and Mosaic Law.¹

Biblical commentator Richard C. H. Lenski has noted that the use of the term "Pentecost" in Acts is a reference to the Jewish festival. He writes that a well-defined, distinct Christian celebration did not exist until later years, when Christians kept the name of "Pentecost" but began to calculate the date of the feast based on Easter rather than Passover.¹ Peter stated that this event was the beginning of a continual outpouring that would be available to all believers from that point on, Jews and Gentiles.

As Christians we accept and love all people. As we know Jesus never turned anyone away, we should care and love everyone. Celebrate your birthday gifts by welcoming others, provide a meal for your guests, and help all who are less fortunate.

Prayer: God, we thank you for all the gifts you bestow on us. May we celebrate our birthday by sharing the presents you give to us.

At the April 28 congregational meeting two items were passed: approval by 77 votes of the distributed list of members to serve on UCP committees beginning July 1, and approval by 75 votes to become a 'bridge church' to offer assistance to any member of a United Methodist Church (UMC) who seeks counsel and help concerning UMC policies on gender issues. Further explanation of bridge churches and other churches in our UMC district which have voted to become them is being planned for inclusion in the *June Parish Life*.

Legacy Giving at United Christian Parish

Legacy Giving

Did you know there is another way to support United Christian Parish besides making your annual pledge and volunteering your time? It's called Legacy Giving, a term that may remind us of death but is really about life and living. The program was established to provide members and friends flexibility in providing a legacy resource supporting the mission and ministry of UCP before or after one's passing.

Recent generous legacy gift donors have played a significant role in helping the church fund important projects that could not be paid for with the annual budget. Projects include a significant renovation to our kitchen, an overhaul of the church's out-of-date fire alarm system, and a mission trip to Rwanda. Legacy gifts in the future are needed to support a variety of needs such as missions projects or building repair and equipment replacement.

UCP's Legacy Giving Program provides for Endowment or Non-Endowment gifts.

- **Endowment Gifts:** An Endowment gift requires preserving the original principal with only the annual earnings available for church use. The UCP Board has the authority to decide how those earnings are spent. Donors do not make specific designations in the case of endowments.
- **Non-Endowment Gifts:** A non-endowment gift allows the principal to be used as designated. Donors may designate how their non-endowment gift is to be used by choosing from five categories as follows:
 1. Undesignated—to be used as determined by the UCP Board. This choice allows spending decisions based on the church's highest priority needs
 2. Missions
 3. Capital Improvements
 4. Worship, Music, and Arts or
 5. Faith Formation and Scholarship.

Legacy giving tools can be a part of an estate plan, a financial plan for the living, or simply an addition to the beneficiaries of your IRA. Some of these options don't require a lawyer to be put in place. Typically, these gifts will also carry significant tax advantages. UCP's Legacy Giving program is an excellent way to create a lasting legacy to support the beliefs and programs of our church as an inclusive community, open to all, passionate about mission and social justice, and loving our neighbors. Heartfelt Donations Dominate March Missions Ministry Meeting

At the March Missions Ministry meeting, donations to the national/local and international organizations in dire need dominated the discussion. Pastor Beth informed the Missions Ministry members of the significant increase in the number of phone calls she has been receiving from persons seeking help with their costs of food, rent and other expenses. The Pastor's Crisis Fund is limited.

The Closet of the Greater Herndon Area gives \$500 annually to all communities of faith whose members volunteer at the facility. The Closet asks that the gift be spent on the needs in our surrounding communities. After discussion, the team applied the \$500 recently given by The Closet to the Pastor's Crisis Fund. Further discussion of UCP's Crisis Fund will be reviewed in the coming meetings.

Additionally, the Missions Ministry approved \$1,000 donations to three local organizations: Herndon-Reston Friendly Instant Sympathetic Help (FISH), Cornerstones and Centreville Labor Resource Center

The international donation of \$1,500 went to World Central Kitchen (WCK) before the Israeli killing of WCK workers in Gaza. The success of World Central Kitchen's efforts to supply large quantities of food for the people of Gaza by sea and the work of Gazans to help build a jetty for food delivery was well known. But since the attack, WCK founder José Andrés said:

"It's not enough to simply try to avoid further humanitarian deaths, which have now approached close to 200. All civilians need to be protected, and all innocent people in Gaza need to be fed and safe."¹

WCK operations were suspended there but

resumed April 29. The organization also feeds others in need throughout the world.

The Missions Ministry is very thankful for the contributions of United Christian Parish and tries to send donations to those they feel can use the funds to support Christ's work in their organizations. The recipients send UCP heartfelt letters of appreciation.

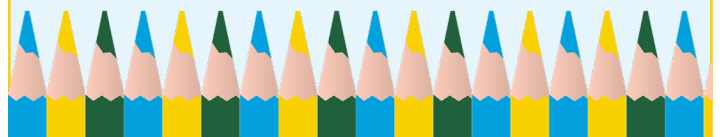


DONATE SCHOOL SUPPLIES FOR STUDENTS IN RWANDA

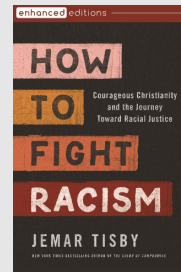

Discussion questions will be emailed for each book before reading begins. You can develop questions of your own too. Let's focus on forwarding this schedule to invite others to join this wonderful group.

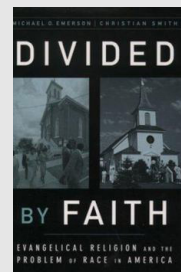

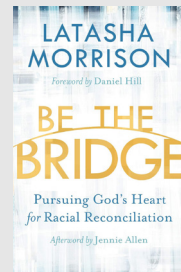

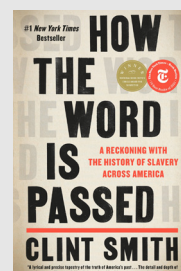

It's Butterfly Season

Several hundred colorful butterflies cross the sanctuary each Easter season in the annual flight that began nearly 50 years ago. But, do you know the roots of this tradition?

After UCP charter member Yvonne Kauffman learned from her sister about a church in Cincinnati that created an Easter butterfly migration, she began the United Christian Parish tradition in the 1970s, first at the Hunters Woods church building and then

extended to Redeemer.

"I made three different patterns and got help from many people in the church to color them, cut them out, and tape them all over the fronts of the sanctuaries, sometimes even on the ceilings," she recalled.

"We used to have to borrow a tall ladder from the Reston Community Center to do it."

This colorful butterfly season tradition continues five decades later.

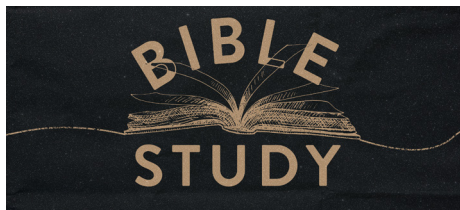
